

In Nova Scotia, paramedics and emergency medical dispatchers are part of the Emergency Medical System (EMS) and are regulated by the Nova Scotia Department of Health. Only registered paramedics may operate an ambulance for EMS in Nova Scotia. Ambulance services are contracted out and managed by a private company.

Paramedics are trained to perform differing levels of medical procedures.

Additional training results in increasing responsibility as well as income. The following paramedic designations are regulated in Nova Scotia by the Emergency Medical System office:

- > Primary Care Paramedic (PCP)/P1
- Advanced Care Paramedic (ACP)/P3
- Emergency Medical Dispatcher

# **COURSES**

### **High School**

To prepare for a paramedic program, complete a high school diploma which includes at least two science courses.

## **Post Secondary**

In Atlantic Canada, most post-secondary training programs are one-year diploma programs offered through private career colleges. These programs provide classroom as well as clinical experience. In addition to high school graduation or equivalency, programs often require a current Class 4 driver's licence and a current first aid certificate. All schools providing paramedic training perform police criminal record checks on all eligible applicants.

Graduates of paramedical training programs may seek further career mobility and opportunities by taking additional training.
